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Number of Students Using the DCF Tuition Exemption Increases: Financial Aid and Passing Courses Remains a Challenge


Although more students than ever are using the DCF tuition exemption, many still are not receiving all the financial aid they need and are struggling to pass courses. Those are key conclusions that can be drawn from a recently released report from the Florida College System.

The number of students in Florida's public colleges using the DCF tuition exemption increased from 3,537 in 2015-16 to 3,871 in 2016-17, a 9% increase during a time when Florida's public college growth rates was less than 5%. During the 2016-17 academic year, 273 postsecondary degrees or certificates were awarded to students with the DCF exemption, and 58% of these students earned Associate in Arts (AA) degrees.

Jhenai Chandler, Director of Student and Administrative Affairs for the Florida College System (FCS), presented the good news during a recent Positive Pathways call as part of the FCS' annual report to the Florida Department of Children and Families (DCF).

The report is filled with valuable information, by colleges, including the number of students using the DCF exemption from foster care, from adopted homes and from relative care. The report also provides information about financial aid, data that Ms. Chandler highlighted because only 46% of students using the DCF tuition exemption also receive any type of financial aid. Furthermore, while students using the DCF tuition exemptions enrolled in 19,922 courses, only 48% received a grade of C or higher. These facts indicate a need for continued strong support for these students, Ms. Chandler said.

New Free Online Training Available for Foster Care Liaisons

During a recent monthly Positive Pathways conference call, two veteran foster care campus liaisons shared their experiences in a practical webinar for network members throughout Florida.

Wendy Joseph, MA and Sandra Seymour Obas, MSW presented an hour-long session titled *A Step* by Step Guide to Serving Students on Campus from Foster Care.

The presentation covered how liaisons can position themselves as effective campus-based support professionals for this growing subpopulation of students.

The duo shared practical advice about how to identify students from foster care on your campus, how to prepare for appointments, and how to handle initial and follow-up meetings.

The webinar also contained inside information on the DCF





Tuition Exemption Form, how to work with community-based care agencies, and the latest information on financial aid, academic services, and scholarships available specifically for young adults from foster care. Ms. Joseph and Mrs. Obas lead the Educate Tomorrow @ Miami Dade College program, which is accessible to more than 400 students on the college's seven campuses and centers. The program began in 2013 and has seen more than 30 students graduate with degrees.

The presenters also spoke about the program's award-winning Changemaker Program, which offers peer tutors and regular community building activities for students.

"It is important for liaisons to help students feel connected, like they are not alone and there are other students right here on campus that are going through similar difficulty," said Mrs. Obas, who is on temporary assignment as the program assistant for Positive Pathways.

Pathways Partner Program AOK Scholars Program Adds 62 New Students for Spring Semester, Aims for 1,000 Students

The AOK Scholars Program, supported by the Lawrence E. White Family Foundation (LWFF), has selected 62 new students to enter the AOK Program beginning in the Spring 2019 semester. This brings the total number of students participating in the innovative program to 270. However, program leaders are aiming for 1,000 students and will open applications up again in April for the Fall 2019 semester.

The program works with students from foster care and related populations at 32 Florida colleges and universities, most of which are active members of the Positive Pathways Network. The five schools with the highest numbers of students using the AOK Scholars funds attend Miami Dade College (51), Florida Atlantic

University (42), Florida State University (38), Florida International University (29), and Valencia College (20). Last semester throughout the state, 12 students in the program earned Associates, Bachelors or Masters degrees with the support of the program, which provides mentoring as well as emergency funds.

"We are keen on success and believe that education is an important part of becoming successful," said Larry White, namesake and founder of LWFF. "We are proud of these scholars and the success they are achieving as part of our program."

The AOK Scholars Program was established by the Lawrence E. White Family Foundation to help students attending college who are most likely to succeed, with timely and quality assistance.
