If you are near the Tampa-St. Petersburg area on October 25, join us for our first-ever Tampa-St. Petersburg regional meeting. FSU's Lisa Jackson Honored as Child Welfare Champion of the Year

Lisa Jackson, director of the Unconquered Scholars Program at Florida State University, was honored as a Child Welfare Champion of the Year during the Florida Department of Children and Families (DCF) annual summit last month.

Jackson, an active member of the Positive Pathways Network, was nominated by former DCF Secretary Mike Carroll for her many years of service to students from foster care striving to reach their education dreams.

"Ms. Jackson has never wavered in her ability to rise to the lofty standard to which students in the program and university officials hold her," wrote Mr. Carroll, in his nomination letter.

Established with 20 students in 2012, the Florida State University Unconquered Scholars Program (Program) now serves more than 100 FSU students who experienced foster care, homelessness, relative care, or ward of the state status.







Students Using the Tuition Exemption Can Soon Look for a Sign



More than 4,000 students using the DCF tuition and fee exemption on each and every public college and university campus will soon be able to identify where help can be found by using the new Positive Pathways display sign.

The sign, designed by a former foster youth who obtained his degree from the Miami Dade College New World School of the Arts/University of Florida, is 18.5 inches tall and 12.5 inches wide. The bold and attractive graphic has the four key values of the program surrounding the Positive Pathways logo (see graphic at left). The sign also has information about the Program's two statewide sponsors, and the URL for the Program's website. There is room for the local college or university to include an institutional logo and information about how to reach the designated campus liaison.

To request your copy, contact Dr. Steve Rios, senior director, at Pathways@EducateTomorrow.org. Our vision is that more and more students using the waiver will become familiar with the sign and seek out the liaisons associated with them for support, guidance, encouragement and information.



Q. What is extended foster care and how does it impact students using the DCF tuition exemption to pursue their post-secondary education?

A. At age 18, students in foster care in Florida who have been living in licensed foster care and who meet other criteria, such as attending high school or a GED program, or being enrolled in college or in a vocational education program, can remain in Florida's independent living program under the extended foster care program. Students in the program can receive monthly living stipends of up to \$1,256 a month to pay expenses while they pursue their education. They are required to stay in touch with caseworkers, who ensure they are making progress in school.

If you are a campus-based foster care liaisons, caseworkers can help confirm that students are eligible for the tuition exemption and they can help advocate for students.
